Reader Says Returned is a training DVD that has been designed to help frontline library staff with everyday issues of customer care.

The main feature is a **short film**, performed by professional actors, depicting a series of typical encounters between library staff and library users. We see excellent customer care in action... occasionally.

The situations will be familiar ones: the scriptwriter worked in public libraries for nearly twenty years. But the training points are delivered with a quirky comic slant.

The DVD also contains a folder of **supporting material**, including a fully annotated transcript of the film.

Reader Says Returned can support a range of courses and training styles: presentations; seminars; discussions; role play; induction or refresher training for individuals or groups.

Versatile, relevant and easy to use, **Reader Says Returned** will become a popular and effective training tool in your library.

The short film

To watch the film, put the disc into the DVD drive of a computer. When the dialogue box appears, choose to play the movie using your computer's DVD player software (such as Cyber Link [®] PowerDVD or InterVideo [®] WinDVD).

You can also watch the film on any standard DVD player.

If you need further technical guidance on using the DVD, please refer to the DVD operation document in the supporting materials folder or to the DVD case inlay card.

What is in the film?

The film comprises eight main scenes and has a total running time of around 23 minutes.

In each scene, a member of staff faces a 'difficult' customer, raising various training issues in a humorous way.

These are the staff:

- Sez Thornhill is an experienced manager, who seems to have lost interest in helping her customers.
- Jonny Arbogast can sometimes be polite and helpful. But usually isn't.
- Min Rosebud is calm, courteous and efficient. She should probably be working somewhere else.

And these are their customers:

- Mr Travis has been asked to pay for some missing DVDs. He is reluctant to do so.
- **Dr Kilgore** would like to make a complaint... every time he visits the library.
- Mrs Aksoy, a Turkish student, is sure she returned her books to the library when they were due back. But the records indicate otherwise.
- Mr Bickle has been using the library for forty years and never returned a book late. Until today.

A short synopsis of each scene can be found in this workbook and in the supporting materials folder of the DVD.

Using the film

Titles are used at critical moments throughout the film. Course leaders may decide to pause the film at these points in order to expand on the questions that have been raised. The film is a springboard for discussion and further training, not a comprehensive manual of instruction.

The film can be viewed from beginning to end, or scene-by-scene. A scene selection menu allows the user to move easily from one scene to another. Course leaders can focus on particular scenes, or play the film through, pausing when they choose.

Supporting material

The DVD includes a folder of documents to assist learners and course leaders. This material cannot be accessed on a DVD player; instead, open the folder on a computer. On a PC, go to **My Computer** or select **Open folder to view files** using Windows Explorer from the dialogue box that appears when the DVD first loads.

How can they be used?

The guide for course leaders is a general introduction to the DVD, based on this section of the workbook.

The transcript is a text version of the film, including every line of dialogue. Use the Bookmarks navigation pane to find the start of a particular scene. The transcript could be used to support role play exercises. It could also be helpful to hearing-impaired users.

The annotated transcript includes images from the film and comments about the training points. Images are indicated by an icon of a paperclip and can be opened by double- or right-clicking on the icon. There are two kinds of comments. Yellow text boxes draw attention to significant actions or lines of dialogue, usually in the form of a question. Notes (indicated by a green 'text note' icon) appear at the beginning and the end of most scenes, and can be opened with a mouse. Notes at the start of a scene reveal a short synopsis and the focus of the training. Notes at the end of a scene summarize some of the key issues that the scene has raised or suggest further questions that might be asked.

The comments are not intended to form a definitive summary of the training points raised by the film. They will be used selectively by course leaders; perhaps not even used at all. Trainees who use the DVD without the guidance of a course leader may find that the comments offer some helpful clarification.

Use the Bookmarks navigation pane to find the start of a particular scene.

The **comments summary** brings together the notes from the annotated transcript. Course leaders may prefer to print the comments pages and make their own annotations.

The **outline** summarizes each scene with a synopsis and a short description of the training focus.

The **illustrated outline** is the outline with photographs.

The **presentation** is an introduction to **Reader Says Returned**, comprising nineteen slides. The PowerPoint [®] version should be opened as 'read only'.

DVD operation provides detailed instructions on playing the disc.



Supporting material

Apart from the PowerPoint [®] presentation, all the training files are Adobe [®] PDF documents that can be opened in Adobe Reader [®] 5.0 and later. They have been tagged for accessibility.

Westgate Films has licensed the printing of these documents for specific training purposes. The licence does not permit users to copy the files from the disc onto a computer or any off-line storage device such as a CD, DVD or USB drive. This would be a breach of copyright.

Jonathan Hansler ('Dr Kilgore') worked with Hull Truck as 'Lance' in their acclaimed production of *Toast*. He played Peter Cook in the highly successful *Pete 'n' Me* at the New End Theatre, Hampstead. Television credits include *My Family, The Queen's Sister* and *Dream Team*. Film credits include *Cracked Eggs* (with Jared Harris) and *Goodbye - the (After)life of Cook and Moore*, which he co-wrote.

Pete Judge is a Bristol-based musician and composer. Tours, performances, and recordings include Super Furry Animals, Congolese legend Papa Noel, Cuba's Asere, Marc Gauvin, and many others. His trumpet-playing can be heard on Austin Chick's XX/XY, Nic Roeg's Sound On Film, and Channel 4's DBC Pierre documentary The Last Aztec.
